Pastor's Column: 4rd Sunday of Lent

I like the story told by Peter Kreeft, a lecturer in Philosophy at Boston College. He was talking about the Catholic belief about the Eucharist. A young Moslem was in the class and came up to him afterwards and said, "I don't think you believe what you say about the Catholic Eucharist!" Ever an enquiring mind, Kreeft asked, "And why do you say that?" "Because," he said, "If I believed what you say you believe, I would prostrate myself before it and never get up again!"

To prostrate oneself before the Body and Blood of Christ, is to prostrate oneself before Jesus dying on the Cross, anticipated, and one with His Eucharistic last supper.

Jesus on the cross was prefigured in the bronze serpent that Moses erected for the healing of those bitten by the fiery serpents.

This story is found in the book of Numbers, 21. The Hebrews, liberated from slavery in Egypt, wandered in the desert and grew tired of the heavenly manna. God punished their growing infidelity with the scourge and bite of the fiery servents.

The original Hebrew word for the "fiery serpents" is the same word we get for the English word, "seraphim." The Seraphim are the "burning ones", angelic beings closest to God, the Ones forever prostrated as it were before God's presence crying, "Holy, Holy, Holy....!". For the Hebrews it wasn't angels, but the fallen angels, the demonic that God allowed to torment them.

The paradox of Moses icon, is both looking back to the Genesis tree and looking forward to the tree of the cross. Jesus enters fully into the ultimate instrument of Satan's power, death, by his death on the cross, in order to triumph over it, through his Resurrection.

So Moses healing symbol stands between two significant trees. There is the tree in the Genesis story from which Adam and Eve ate in disobedience and so lost the happiness God intended for them. Entwined around that tree, at least in the imaginations of artists, was a serpent. Then there is the tree of the cross. Adam and Eve chose not to eat of the fruit of the tree of life, but from the forbidden tree.

The new tree is the tree of the cross. The fruit hanging from that tree is Jesus. We eat of the fruit of that tree in Holy Communion, the Body and Blood of the Lord under the form of bread and wine and the life lost by our first parents, eating the fruit of the Eden tree, is restored super-abundantly.

The gift of Jesus' Body and Blood high-lights and underscores the beautiful words of today's Gospel. "God loved the world, so much that He gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him may have eternal life."

We do not define and give special meaning to the bread and wine; the Body and Blood of Christ defines and gives meaning to us.

When we eat the Body of the Lord and drink his Blood, the elements are not absorbed into us, we are absorbed into Him.

The "Incarnation," God sharing our humanity fully and completely, defies the capabilities of our intellect to conceptualize and our imaginations to picture.

To feel remotely into the reality of this expression of love we can ask ourselves, who is it that loves me the most? - and then realise that God loves me, at least as much, as the person who loves me the most. "Truth" wrote St Thomas, "wherever it is found and whomsoever speaks it, is of the Holy Spirit." It is a "rum-thing" that a young Moslem can articulate profoundly, a truth lost on so many Catholics of our time!"

Explaining parts of the Mass, an excerpt from YOUCAT (Youth Catechism of the Catholic Church)

What happens in the Church when she celebrates the Eucharist?

Every time the Church celebrates the \rightarrow **EUCHARIST**, she stands before the source for which she herself constantly springs anew. By "eating" the Body of Christ, the Church becomes the Body of Christ, which is just another name for the Church. In the sacrifice of Christ, who gives himself to us, body and soul, there is room for our whole life. We can unite everything-our work and our sufferings, our joys-with Christ's sacrifice. If we offer ourselves in this way, we are transformed: We become pleasing to God and like good, nourishing bread for our fellowmen. Again and again we grumble about the -> CHURCH, as though she were just an association of more or less good people. In reality the Church is what happens daily in a mysterious way at the altar. God gives himself to each one of us individually, and he wants to transform us through → **COMMUNION** with him. Once we are transformed, we are supposed to transform the world. Everything else that the Church is besides that is secondary.

EUCHARIST - Eucharist was at first the name for the prayer of thanksgiving that preceded the transformation of the bread and wine into Christ's Body and Blood in the liturgy of the early Church. Later the term was applied to the whole celebration of the Mass.

CHURCH - consists of those called together from all nations (from Greek ex kaleo, ekklesia) who through Baptism belong to the Body of Christ. COMMUNION - By Communion, we mean receiving the Body and Blood of Christ in the transformed (conse-crated) gifts of bread and wine. This occurs as a rule during Holy Mass, but also on certain occasions outside of Mass (for instance, when Holy Communion is brought to the sick). Communion only under the species of bread is also a full communion with Christ.
