Pastor's Column : 5th Sunday of Lent

W. Sommerset Maughan retells beautifully the old story of the Merchant of Bagdad. There was a merchant in Bagdad who sent his servant to market to buy provisions and in a little while the servant came back, white and trembling, and said, "Master, just now, when I was in the market place I was jostled by a stranger in the crowd and when I turned, I saw it was Death that jostled me! The Grim Reaper looked at me and made a threatening gesture. Now, lend me your horse, and I will ride away from this city and avoid my fate. I will go to far-off Samarra and there Death will not find me." The merchant lent him his horse and the servant mounted it, and he dug his spurs in its flanks and rode as fast as the horse could gallop to Samarra. Curious, the merchant went down to the market place and he saw Death standing in the crowd and so went up to him and said, "Why did you make a threatening gesture to my servant when you saw him this morning?" Death replied, "That was not a threatening gesture but a start of surprise. I was astonished to see him in Bagdad, for I had an appointment with him tonight in Samarra!"

As the story suggests, timing is pivotal. Timing is pivotal in John's Gospel too. Jesus talks about his hour, either, not yet, or yet to come. Here, in this important reflection, it has arrived.

It has arrived, because in the OT there were many prophecies, eg Isaiah, Zechariah and Micah, that one of the signs of the time of Salvation, will be the conversion of the Gentiles and their coming to worship the one true God.

The Greeks asking to see Jesus, is seen by him as a fulfilment of the prophecies and a sign that his hour has come. Jesus then talks of his passion and death as the ultimate act of praise and glory to God his Father. Jesus then refers to himself as a grain of wheat that needs to be buried and die, in order to bear fruit.

This has clear Eucharistic connotations. One fruit of Jesus death and Resurrection is the Eucharist. The blood flowing from his pierced heart underscores this reality. This fruit becomes the life of the world, as he says elsewhere; "unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood you cannot have life in you".

The hating of one's life that Jesus speaks of, is a colourful Middle-Eastern way of speaking, meaning, making a preferential choice for Him, over and above anything else. When Jesus talks of laying down his life and a casting out of the Prince of this world, he is referring to a real exorcism. John in his Gospel doesn't relate exorcism stories. He sees Jesus sacrifice on the cross, as the ultimate cosmic exorcism and re-establishing of the reign of God on earth.

Jesus then takes the vision of an end time, when all the Gentiles will come to the Temple and Jerusalem. He identifies and replaces Jerusalem and its Temple with his own body, specifically his body crucified. It is the cross that will draw all people, including the Gentiles, as well as Jews, to Himself.

So when the Greeks said to Philip and Andrew, "we want to see Jesus" Jesus response is indeed himself, but himself crucified. That is why the cross is such a central and defining symbol in our Catholic Tradition.

Explaining parts of the Mass, an excerpt from YOUCAT (Youth Catechism of the Catholic Church)

What is the right way to honour the Lord present in the bread and wine?

Because God is truly present in the consecrated species of bread and wine, we must preserve the sacred gifts with the greatest reverence and worship our Lord and Redeemer in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

If there are consecrated hosts left over after the celebration of Holy → **EUCCHARIST**, they are kept in sacred vessels in the tabernacle. Since the Most Blessed Sacrament is present in them, the → **TABERNACLE** is one of the most venerable places in every church. We genuflect before any tabernacle. Certainly, anyone who is really following Christ will recognise him in the poorest of the poor and serve him in them. But he will also find time to spend in adoration before the tabernacle and offer his love to our Eucharistic Lord.

EUCCHARIST - Eucharist was at first the name for the prayer of thanksgiving that preceded the transformation of the bread and wine into Christ's Body and Blood in the liturgy of the early Church. Later the term was applied to the whole celebration of the Mass.

TABERNACLE – In a way reminiscent of the Old Testament Ark of the Covenant, the tabernacle developed in the Catholic Church as a prominent, richly ornamented place for preserving the Most Blessed Sacrament (Christ in the form of bread).
