Pastor's Column : Palm Sunday

This Sunday is also called the Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. It is so named, because one of the synoptic Gospel's telling of Jesus' passion is read. Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem is the first Gospel read today. Jesus is being welcomed into Jerusalem as the King-Messiah.

Why does he ride on a colt, a donkey? Matthew tells us that this is a fulfilment of Zechariah's prophecy. Mark has a different emphasis. He notes that this colt has never been ridden before. If you know anything about donkeys, apart from being notoriously stubborn, they will buck you off, if not tamed. Mark is telling us that Jesus can befriend wild animals, as he was at home with the wild beasts, in the wilderness when tempted, as he could also subdue storms. Jesus is Lord of Creation and is also the new Adam, who in Eden was at home with creation and its creatures.

Mark's highlighting of leafy branches is significant. For some, the palm was a symbol of sedition. In Jerusalem some Roman coins, in particular those with Caesar's head, were over-stamped with a palm, as a gesture of rebellion. For others, palm waving was a traditional way of welcoming royalty.

In the Passion reading of Mark there are some elements that can be highlighted. In Gethsemane, a name meaning "olive press" he prays, "abba, Father". Much is made of this palindrome (a word spelt same forward and backwards), often rendered, "Dad or daddy". In truth it was just the common Aramaic word for "Father".

Mark emphasises a favourite theme of his, "watch", "watch and pray." It was common after Passover for Jews to keep vigil in prayer, which could be quite challenging after drinking the prescribed 4 cups of red wine of the Passover meal!

On Jesus' arrest, Mark makes reference to a young man, in a loin cloth who runs off naked. Who is this young man? One legend is that it was John, the beloved, who, in his retreat collides with Mary and Mary of Magdala. They cloak him and they turn him around, eventually he ends up with them at the cross!

Others see its symbolism, as a disciple running away from his baptismal commitment (loin cloth sometimes worn at that ceremony). Another interpretation is that it was Mark, writing in a cameo appearance (like Peter Jackson at Brie, in the "Lord of the Rings").

In the trial of Jesus, the main accusation against Jesus is blasphemy. When challenged Jesus replies, "I am". Does this hint at the Tetragrammaton, "I am who I am!" When Jesus says he will sit on God's throne and coming on clouds, Jesus explicitly identifies himself with God. Jesus is thus condemned to death.

We need to understand that Roman crucifixion was designed for maximum humiliation of the victim. The victim is to be a vivid example of what happens, if you are seditious. The scourging, often a shredding, bloodied the victim for maximum visual impact, then crucified naked and exposed for maximum humiliation. Ray Downing, who extricated the 3D image of Jesus from the Shroud of Turin, (His burial cloth), described in tears what he saw as a human train-wreck.

St Paul uses the Greek word, "Kenosis", God emptying himself of his Godhead, to fully share our humanity. Mark's Spartan account of Jesus' passion and death can only leave us stunned at the extent and cost of our salvation, but also the urgency and gravity and necessity of our response.

[Explaining parts of the Mass, an excerpt from YOUCAT \(Youth Catechism of the Catholic Church\)](#)

How often must a Catholic Christian participate in the celebration of the Eucharist?

A Catholic Christian is obliged to attend Holy Mass on all Sundays and holy days of obligation. Anyone who is really seeking Jesus' friendship responds as often as possible to Jesus' personal invitation to the feast.

Actually, for a genuine Christian, "Sunday duty" is just as inappropriate as "kiss duty" would be for someone truly in love. No one can have a living relationship with Christ without going to the place where he is waiting for us. Therefore, from ancient times the celebration of Mass has been the "heart of Sunday" and the most important appointment in the week.
