# Pastor's Column 3rd Sunday of Easter 2024

I recently had a rare experience, quite astonishing actually, that a book I had lent someone was returned. Given the person concerned, I wasn't surprised, but in general, books, like ball-point pens, seem to have fallen outside any considerations of moral theology. The basic principle of justice, "res clamat domino," "the thing calls to its owner" in the case of books seem to have been muted. The book was "Ring of Truth" by an Anglican Biblical scholar, J B Phillips. In it, though sceptical of such things, he recounts two sudden and uninvited encounters with the ghost of the then recently deceased C S Lewis. In them, Lewis, "rosily radiant," as he described him, messaged him on a personal issue he was grappling with at the time. Phillips mentioned these visitations to a saintly bishop he knew, who remarked, "My dear J...this sort of thing is happening all the time!"

Ghosts are a real and not uncommon phenomenon, not only now, but also in the time of Jesus.

His disciples can be forgiven for thinking, Jesus appearing among them was a ghost, a disembodied soul.

There were different beliefs about the afterlife in first century Judaism. The Sadducees believed death was a literal full-stop. We just stopped existing. Others, like Herod, believed that a form of reincarnation was possible. The Pharisees believed in an ultimate general resurrection of all from the dead. Jews knew about Saul consulting the witch at Endor, who summoned Samuel from the dead.

In today's colloquialisms, we would say that Jesus' disciples "freaked out," in spite of him greeting them with, "Shalom-peace!" Jesus proves to them his realness and bodiliness, by inviting them to touch him, especially his wounds and asking for something to eat; still they disbelieved.

Jesus teaches them that the law of Moses (Torah), the prophetic books, (Nebi'im) and the psalms (Ketubim), collectively called "TaNaKh," pointed to the reality of what they were experiencing. He then opened their minds to understand the Scriptures.

This is a key message of today's Gospel - when we take up the Scriptures to read, we must first pray, asking Jesus to open our minds to understand His Word communicated through the Holy Spirit. Human effort can only go so far in understanding Scripture, grace too, is necessary.

The bodily Resurrection of Jesus is the Archimedean point of human history, promising and looking forward to our own bodily resurrection- in and by which we will live forever. Think about it and be astonished. Think about it and be full of hope. Think about it and be full of joy!

#### Explaining parts of the Mass, an excerpt from YOUCAT (Youth Catechism of the Catholic Church)

#### May the Eucharist be administered to non-Catholic Christians also?

Holy → COMMUNION is the expression of the unity of the Body of Christ. To belong to the Catholic → CHURCH, one must be baptised in her, share her faith, and live in union with her. It would be a contradiction if the Church were to invite to Communion people who do not (vet) share the faith and life of the Church. It would damage the credibility of the sign of the  $\rightarrow$  EUCHARIST.

Individual Orthodox Christians may ask to receive Holy Communion at a Catholic liturgy, because they share the Eucharistic faith of the Catholic Church, although their Church is not yet full communion with the Catholic Church. In the case of members of other Christian "ecclesial communities" or denominations. Holy Communion may be administered to an individual if there is a grave necessity and evidence of faith in the Real Presence in the Eucharist. Joint celebrations of the Eucharist / Lord's Supper by Catholics and Protestants are the goal and the wish of all ecumenical efforts: to anticipate them, however, without having established the reality of the Body of Christ in one faith and in the one Church is dishonest and therefore not allowed. Other ecumenical liturgies, in which Christians of various denominations pray together, are good and are also desired by the Catholic Church.

COMMUNION - (from Latin communio = fellowship): By Communion, we mean receiving the Body and Blood of Christ in the transformed (consecrated) gifts of bread and wine. This occurs as a rule during Holy Mass, but also on certain occasions outside of Mass (for instance, when Holy Communion is brought to the sick). Communion only under the species of bread is also a full communion with Christ.

CHURCH - (from the Greek kyriake = belonging to the Lord); consists of those called together from all nations (from Greek ex kaleo. ekklesia) who through Baptism belong to the Body of Christ.

EUCHARIST - (Greek eucharistia = thanksgiving): Eucharist was at first the name for the prayer of thanksgiving that preceded the transformation of the bread and wine into Christ's Body and Blood in the liturgy of the early Church. Later the term was applied to the whole celebration of the Mass.
